## **Email policy:**

#### Course description: Objectives:

- Students will develop a deeper understanding of health psychology and their own healthcare experiences in order to become more savvy consumers of healthcare with knowledge of their own rights.
- As potential future healthcare providers, students will develop frameworks that allow them to analyze healthcare systems and issues they may encounter as healthcare professionals

#### Course structure:

- This is an in-person, lecture course. Students should read this syllabus thoroughly and ensure they have allocated enough time to complete readings and assignments. The last day to drop this class with a full refund can be found in the MSU Schedule of Courses (https://schedule.msu.edu/default.aspx).
- Different due dates apply to different types of assignments (e.g., discussion posts vs. analysis papers). Please carefully read the Assignment Schedule in this syllabus and pay particular attention to due dates.
- All times noted in this syllabus are Eastern Standard Time (EST).
- Please refer to the schedule below for assignment due dates. Unless you notify the instructor about challenges meeting a deadline <u>BEFORE THE DEADLINE</u>, reduced points will be awarded after missing a due date. 10% <u>WILL BE DEDUCTED PER DAY LATE AND NO ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THREE DAYS PAST THE DUE DATE WITHOUT EXCEPTION.</u>

Attendance: Students are expected to attend class. Attendance will not be taken formally, but a series of unannounced quizzes will be given throughout the term and will account for 13% of the course grade. Additionally, exams will include material from lecture and discussion. Irregular attendance will affect a student's performance (grade). No videotaping of lectures is permitted (audiotaping is permissible). If students miss a class they are encouraged to reach out to other students for notes and discussion of what was missed.

#### Additionally:

- Students whose names do not appear on the official class list for this course may not participate in this class.
- If you are going to be absent from class for a week (or more) and unable to complete an assignment on time, you must inform the instructor in advance to be formally excused and still receive credit for the assignment. You must provide the instructor with an explanation in writing at least 24 hours before the absence. Emails received later than this will not be honored and your assignment will not be accepted.

## **Assignments & grading criteria**

Each of these grade elements is covered in detail below.

Quizzes: Over the semester, 6 unannounced quizzes will be given in class. Quizzes will measure the students' knowledge of the readings, and lecture material for that week.

- Each quiz is worth 10 points.
- One guiz will be given on the first day of class and will cover the syllabus

Participation in online discussion boards: Traditionally small classes allow the instructor to engage in discussion with the students on key topics. Due to the size of this class, comprehensive opportunities for class discussion are constrained. Through the D2L Discussion Board feature, we will create further opportunities for all students to engage in an online learning community of dialogue and interaction. This includes:

- There will be a total of six discussion boards throughout the semester (see detailed class schedule for due dates).
- See the rubric on discussion board posts on D2L for detailed instructions and point breakdown.

Brief analysis papers: two brief analysis papers will be due during the course of the semester. There will be three paper topics posted – students may only turn in two; if a student writes all three papers the teaching assistant *will not grade* the third submission. Please choose two of the three paper topics and <u>WRITE ONLY TWO</u> analysis papers. Papers must meet the following specifications:

- *Minimum* 2 pages in length and a *maximum* of 4 pages
- Double spaced, basic font style (Arial, Times New Roman, Calibri, etc.)
- 12p point font size and 1" margins on all sides

In-text citations for any materials cited beyond class materials (i.e. you do
not have to cite the textbook or class readings, but if you reference materials
outside the class reading list use standard APA style for in-text citations and

Analysis papers give students an opportunity to use class materials and demonstrate their grasp of key theories, and concepts in Health Psychology

- Each brief analysis paper will be worth 50 points (~10% of the total class grade).
- Consult the rubric on D2L for detailed instructions and point breakdown.

**Grade appeals** on papers must: 1) be in writing, 2) clearly spell out why the student believes their work should be re-evaluated and include reference(s) to lecture materials or readings to support their argument, and 3) **be submitted via D2L email to the teaching assistant and the instructor within three business days of the grades for the paper being posted**. Following the three-day period grades for papers are final and appeals will not be considered.

Exams: Two in-class exams will be given during the term, each worth 100 points. Exams will be multiple choice and scored on Scantron sheets; students are responsible for bringing a pencil to class or finding one to use. Questions can be drawn from lectures, readings, class discussions, posted videos or other class materials. These exams are <u>each</u> worth 19% of the total grade. Late arrivals can be accommodated only until the first exam is turned in – and after that will not be permitted to take the exam.

The final exam is scheduled for **Wednesday**, **December 11**, **FROM 10AM TO NOON IN 101 NORTH KEDZIE**. The exam will concentrate on the material from the last third of the course, but questions regarding major topics from the first two thirds of the course are also fair game. Questions can be drawn from lectures, readings, class discussions, posted videos or other class materials. The exam will be scored on a Scantron sheet, but additional written questions are possible as well; students are responsible for bringing a pencil to class or finding one to use. The exam is worth 100 points and accounts for 19% of the grade in this class.

Make-up quizzes and exams: Make-up quizzes or exams are at the instructor's discretion and require a logical argument presented to the instructor in writing within 24 hours of the missed quiz or exam – beyond the 24-hour period no make-ups will be permitted. Other obligations (family gatherings, job interviews, vacations) are not acceptable excuses and will result in the student receiving a 0 for the missed quiz/exam. If the instructor agrees to grant a make-up quiz or exam it may include written essay questions.

If students are going to miss an exam due to a religious holiday, or required participation in a University-sponsored event (e.g. a debate team tournament, scheduled conference presentation or as part of a sports team event), they must notify the instructor in writing at least two weeks in advance of the exam/quiz and provide a reason for the absence.

Exam scores will be posted through D2L as soon as they are available, but the exam questions will not be posted. Students wanting to reviews specific questions may view the exam during an office hour with the teaching assistant or instructor, but must do so within three business days of the exam grade being posted. FOLLOWING THE THREE-DAY PERIOD EXAM GRADES ARE FINAL AND NO APPEALS WILL BE CONSIDERED.

Extra credit: There is no extra credit in this class. Follow the syllabus, study and bring your "A" game! Students are responsible for tracking their progress in the class and ensuring their performance gets them the grade they "need" or want from the class. No other extra credit or "grade bumps" are possible. Last minute appeals will not result in grade changes.

**Honors option:** Regrettably, I am not able to offer an honors option for this course.

- You should submit papers to Turnitin Dropboxes without identifying information included in the paper (e.g., name or student number), the Desire 2 Learn system will automatically show this information to me when I view the submission, but the information will not be retained by Turnitin. If you forget and submit your paper with your identifying information on it, it will be retained in the Turnitin repository.

In choosing to use Turnitin in our class, I have agreed to follow five guidelines. They are:

- I will use Turnitin as part of a balanced approach to encourage academic integrity and foster student success.
- I will openly disclose use of Turnitin in this course on the syllabus and at the time assignments are announced.
- For a given assignment, I will use Turnitin for all papers.
- I will make the final determination of originality and integrity.
- To ensure privacy, I will ask students to remove identification (e.g., names and student numbers) from submissions.
