**Course Description**: This is an in person course. This course provides an overview of social psychology. Research in social psychology uses the scientific method to understand the relationship between people and their social environments. Research in social psychology has implications for all aspects of life, because social influence is pervasive: romantic relationships, economic decision-making, child rearing, marketing and advertising, group identification, political negotiations and affiliations, etc. Whatever you want to do with your life, social psychology plays a role. There is no honors option for the course.

## **Participation & Attendance**

You are expected to attend lectures, answer questions using iClicker, ask your own questions, participate in activities, and generally be an active and engaged learner. From my experience as both a student and a teacher, this is the best way to enjoy a class and learn the most from it. Please save your side conversations, text messages, and shopping for after class.

You get points for coming to class and partcipating. Specifically, I will present questions to be answered by iClicker at the beginning of each class covering material from the previous class and readings, along with questions at the end of each class covering the material from that class. There will also be questions spread throughout the class, both for review and for use as demonstrations. To get credit for attendance that day, you must complete some of the questions, including those at the beginning and end of class.

- You will receive 2 points for each class (excluding exams).
- Questions start on the <u>second</u> day of classes.
- You can miss a total of 5 online Question classes without penalty (i.e. 2.5 weeks of class).
- You can use a physical iClicker or the iClicker app for your phone.
- You do not need to get the questions correct to get credit. You just need to respond
- If you forget your iClicker, you run out of batteries, or the web app isn't working, there is a two-time-use sign-in sheet. Once you have used your two sign ins, any future classes where you miss iClicker questions will result in no credit for that day. If there is a problem with your attendance, please contact a teaching assistant.
- Please note: If you have someone else use your iClicker for you when you are not in class, this is a violation of academic integrity policies. You will lose all class participation and bonus points for the semester and will be reported to your dean for an academic integrity violation.
- Please ensure your iClicker is setup before the second class (January 12th). You can

  responsibility to make sure these things work.
- We will track attendance in 23 classes, but you can miss five of these without penalty. This mean you need to attend 18 classes to receive full participation credit (36 points). If you attend more than 18 classes, the additional points are essentially extra credit (10 possible points).

## Exams

There are five exams in total. An exam comes at the end of each section of the course, plus a final exam covering the entire course at the very end. Exams are 60 points each. <u>Your lowest</u> <u>two grades will be dropped</u>. Exams will be multiple choice, with some short-answer and fill-inthe-blank questions. The exams will be conducted online and so will necessarily be open-note and open-book. However, please recognize that you will still need to study. You will not have time to hunt through your notes and readings and still complete the exams on time. Exams start at the start of the class time (240pm) and last exactly 1 hour (340pm). The final exam's start time is TBD. It will also be exactly 1 hour.

Please take detailed notes on the lecture material (slides, discussions, videos); you will be tested on it. The slides for this course are designed to supplement the lecture and are not the sum total of what is discussed during the lecture. Research shows that providing students with copies of slides does not help them learn or remember the material any better. For that reason, I do not provide copies of my slides until after the lecture. Developing note-taking skills is an important part of your education, and you should practice it in this class. If I ever go too quickly, please do not hesitate to ask that I repeat something or slow down.

## Assignments

There are four possible assignments that ask you to apply social psychology to daily life, think about social psychological concepts, or delve deeper into social psychological research. You will do two of these four assignments. All of the assignments are worth 20 points each. You <u>must complete one article analysis and one application assignment</u>. Please note that if you complete extra assignments, your <u>first</u> score will be counted. Information about the assignments are on D2L. Due dates for the assignments are on D2L and in the schedule below.

Assignments are accepted without penalty up to one week after the due date. After one week, late assignments are no longer accepted. The one exception to this is Application Assignment #2. The absolute last day to turn in this assignment is April 28<sup>th</sup> at 11:59pm. This is necessary so that we have time to grade the assignment before grades are due to the university.

## **Make-up Policy**

I understand that you will occasionally have health issues that prevent them from coming to class. I want to encourage you to stay home from lectures when feeling sick and therefore have a flexibly policy for makeup exams due to illness. I trust that you will not abuse



this flexibility, so please only use this makeup policy when you are showing symptoms, are sick, and/or test positive for a contagious virus that rhymes with lovid. <u>The only requirement for</u> <u>making up exams is that you must email me before the class-period the exam begins</u>—even just a few minutes before to be eligible to makeup an exam. In other words, forgetting about an exam or sleeping through class is not an acceptable excuse. If you do not notify me before the class or exam begins, you will not be able to make up the points (remember, you can drop your lowest exam score). Because this policy is already very flexible, there are no exceptions to this policy.

If you cannot take the exam because of a university-scheduled event (e.g., a commitment for a sports team), a religious holiday, or some other acceptable event that you could have foreseen, you must notify me at least one week before the exam to be eligible for a makeup.

## **Research Participation Hours**

One way to learn about social psychology is to participate in psychological research. I've been out of school since 2012 and I still participate in studies. They help me see things through participants' eyes and give me better insight into how studies are conducted.

You are required to participate in 4 hours of research participant in the psychology subject pool. You will receive 5 points per hour (20 points in total). Information on participating in research is on D2L. Please follow the instructions posted there. All research must be completed by *Friday*, *April 28 at 5:00pm*.

If you would like to complete an alternative assignment (10-page literature review) instead of research participation, you must inform me before March 1. After March 1, you no longer have the option of doing the alternative assignment.

Please note that your Sona credits will not appear in the D2L gradebook until after the last day of classes. Sometime after the weekend of April 28, I will upload your credits to D2L. I do not have access to your Sona credits until after Friday, April 28.

## Extra Credit

**The first type of extra credit** is participation in psychology research. Ever hour completed after your first four hours will be extra credit. You will receive 1 point for every 1 hour of research participation, with a maximum of 6 points (6 extra hours) of extra credit added to your final grade. You must see the documentation on D2L for information on research participation! All research must be completed by Friday, April 28 at 5:00pm.

If you would like to complete an alternative assignment (10-page literature review) instead of research participation, you must inform me before March 1. After March 1, you no longer have the option of doing the alternative assignment.

*The second type of extra credit* is creating a meme that illustrates a concept in the course. It is worth 2 points. You can do this 2 times. Each concept needs to be different. They should be turned in by 5pm on Friday, April 28th, but can be turned in at any time.

All I ask is that you are *respectful* to your colleagues in the class and to people and groups not present in the class.



Discussing some topics in social psychology can sometimes be delicate and evoke strong emotions. Therefore, I ask that we make sure that we all make an effort to be respectful to one another and to keep the discussions we have in the course confidential. Racism, sexism, anti-LGBTQ prejudice, religious prejudice, political prejudice etc will not be tolerated. In addition, smoking, fight clubs, dinosaur breading, and minotaur hunting are forbidden.

We are a community of social psychologists and part of being in a community is making decisions to help keep the entire community healthy.
