Course Description

This is an in-person course. This course provides an overview of social psychology. Research in social psychology uses the scientific method to understand the relationship between people and their social environments. Research in social psychology has implications for all aspects of life, because social influence is pervasive: romantic relationships, economic decision-making, child rearing, marketing, and advertising, group identification, political negotiations and affiliations, etc. Whatever you want to do with your life, social psychology plays a role.

Attendance and Participation

You are expected to attend lectures, ask questions, participate in activities, and generally be an active and engaged learner. This is the best way to enjoy a class and learn the most from it (also the best way to perform well grade-wise). Please save your side conversations, text messages, shopping, and video gaming for after class. I take attendance via iClicker. Attending class gets you points towards your final grade (and it helps with the learning process when preparing for the quizzes and exams).

To get credit for attendance for each lecture, you need to enroll via iClicker and answer the iClicker question that I present during each lecture.

- You receive 1 point for each lecture attended (you can miss 4 lectures, 24 lectures with attendance in total, which makes 20 points in total, exam dates excluded, see schedule below)
- The lecture question starts at the 2nd day of classes
- You can use a physical iClicker or the iClicker app for your phone
- The question doesn't need to be answered correctly. You just need to respond.
- Please note: If someone else uses your iClicker for you while you are not in class, this is a violation of academic integrity policies. You will lose all class participation and bonus points for the semester and will be reported to your dean for an academic integrity violation.

Quizzes and Exams

There will be five short quizzes (10 multiple-choice questions each, max of 20 points per quiz), one mid-term exam and one final exam. A quiz follows each section of the course, the mid-term exam covers the sections that we've covered before the mid-term exam, and the final exam covers the entire course at the very end of the semester. Of the five short quizzes, the four best grades count towards your final grade (i.e., the lowest grade or one absence from the quiz will be dropped). The quizzes, mid-term exams, and final exams are in person. They start on time! You have 20 minutes for the quiz and the entire class time (i.e., 75min) for the mid-term and final exams.

Please take detailed notes on the lecture material (slides, discussions, videos) and please read the book chapters; you will be tested on all of it. The slides for this course are designed to supplement the lecture and are not the sum total of what is discussed during the lecture. Research shows that providing students with copies of slides does not help them learn or remember the material any better. For that reason, I do not provide copies of my slides until after the lecture. Developing note-taking skills is an important part of your education, and you should practice it in this class. If I ever go too quickly, please do not hesitate to ask that I repeat something or slow down.

Make-up Policy

I understand that with the ongoing pandemic, you will occasionally have health issues that prevent you from coming to class. I want to encourage you to stay home from lectures when feeling sick and therefore have a flexible policy for makeup exams due to illness. I trust that you will not abuse this flexibility, so please only use this makeup policy when you are showing symptoms or are sick. The only requirement for making up exams is that you must email me before the class-period the exam begins—even just a few minutes before to be eligible to makeup an exam. In other words, forgetting about an exam or sleeping through class is not an acceptable excuse. If you do not notify me before the class or exam begins, you will not be able to make up the points (remember, you can drop your lowest exam score). If you cannot take the exam because of a university-scheduled event (e.g., a commitment for a sports team), a religious holiday, or some other acceptable event that you could have foreseen, you must notify me at least one week before the exam to be eligible for a makeup.

Summary Assignment

You have two assignments that are due at midterm (Assignment #1) and at the end of the class (Assignment #2). For each assignment, please *read, summarize, and respond to questions regarding one of the research articles* uploaded on d2l.msu.edu ("Assignment_Articles" file) and write a 500-word summary (please use the "Assignment_Template" file). Submission deadline is October 27, 2022, at 11:59pm EST for the first assignment and December 8, 2022, at 11:59pm EST for the summary counts for 15 points each.

Extra Credit

You have the option to do two extra credits: study participation and social experiment. You can choose to do both and earn a total of 40 extra credit points.

The first type of extra credit is **Study Participation.** You are all invited to participate in a 15week longitudinal study which starts as soon as classes start (Sept 1, 2022). For each week of participation in the study you receive 2 points (30 points total). Further information can be found on d2l. Look for the "PSYC 235 Personality Study" document in the "Extra Credit" folder. If you do not feel comfortable to participate in the study but would like to receive extra credits, you can choose the Alternative Assignment posted on the d2l.

The second type of extra credit is to **Conduct and Report on a Social Experiment** that lasts for one week and submit a summary of how it went. The proposal of your social experiment can be uploaded any time before your one-week experiment starts (please use the template on d2l.msu.edu, in the "Extra Credit" folder) and the report is due within 7 days after your experiment ended (Last possible submission date for experiment summaries is December 8, 2022; also, please use the template in the "Extra Credit" folder on d2l). This social experiment must be **positive** and must be planned with a positive change for you, your relationship partners, or your social environment in mind. In other words, please do not conduct a social experiment that includes harming, bullying, ostracizing, or shaming someone else. But you can test if sending your partner an affectionate text every day influences you or them, if calling your mom more often has an effect on you or them (or the whole family and relatives), or if smiling at strangers, the cashier, or children has an effect on you, them, or others. Feel free to be as creative as possible. You can conduct one experiment that counts for 10 points. The points are only assigned when the proposal and the report are submitted on time.

House Rules

I value open discussion of all of the relevant topics related to that day's class. I want to hear your thoughts and for you to feel comfortable expressing them in class. A large part of what I enjoy about teaching this course is hearing your thoughts, opinions, and analysis of the topics we discuss.

All I ask is that you are respectful to your colleagues in the class and to people and groups not present in the class. Discussing some topics in social psychology can sometimes be delicate and evoke strong emotions. Therefore, I ask that we make sure that we all make an effort to be respectful to one another and to keep the discussions we have in the course confidential. Racism, sexism, anti-LGBTQ+ prejudice, religious prejudice, political prejudice etc. will not be tolerated.
