

Course Overview: Until recently, most psychological research focused on the experiences of men and was conducted by male researchers. The unique experiences of women were either ignored or extrapolated from the experiences of men. The psychology of women aims to correct this imbalance by focusing on the experiences of women. In this course, we'll study the ways in which men and women are different, but also how they are similar. We'll cover theories and research related to women's socialization, development, work experiences, sexuality, and health. In addition, we will explore the diversity that exists among women, particularly in regards to race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, and sexual orientation.

Course Goals: 1) To learn about the research methods and major theories relevant to the psychology of women. 2) To learn to think critically about conclusions made by psychologists and other social scientists. 3) To apply ideas from the course to your own life experiences.

Attendance: Attendance in class is expected, although no formal attendance will be taken. However, there are randomly given quizzes, and exams will draw heavily from lecture materials and class discussions, so attending class regularly is to your benefit. In addition, there will be topics and concepts covered in lecture that will not be found in the textbook. If you must miss class, you are encouraged to meet with one or more of your peers to discuss the material that you missed.

<u>Honors Option</u>: There is an honors option for this course, which involves creating an ePhoto Album, participating in discussions with other honors option students, and writing a paper. **Email Dr. Weaver before** 9/13/19 for instructions.

Evaluation Criteria:

Written Assignments: There are three short assignments offered in this class, each are approximately 2-4 pages in length. You will pick two out of the three to complete. This is not a lowest score gets dropped situation. Your first two graded assignments will be counted. For example, if you turn in all three assignments, only the first two assignments will be graded and counted towards your final grade. The three assignment options will be posted on the D2L course webpage for you to plan accordingly. Each assignment's specific due date is only for that assignment. For example, you cannot turn in Assignment 3 when Assignment 1 is due, or you cannot turn in Assignment 1 when Assignment 2 is due. These papers will allow you the opportunity to

apply the concepts learned in the class to the outside world. Each assignment is worth 50 points (10% of your final grade), so in total the two graded assignments account for 20% of your final grade (100 points).

If you believe your assignment grade is incorrect, you may appeal the grade. All grade appeals must observe the following rules: 1) they must be in writing; 2) you must clearly provide support for the appeal by citing relevant page(s) in the textbook or the relevant lecture material; 3) appeals must be emailed to Rosaura (doming75@msu.edu) with Dr. Weaver CC'ed (weaver71@msu.edu) within 5 days of the posted grade.

<u>Online Group Discussions</u>: You will be put into a random discussion group of 10 - 15 other students in your class. Each of the seven discussion board weeks is worth 4 points. Your lowest two weeks will be dropped. Therefore, only your top five discussion board weeks will be counted towards your final grade for a total of 20 points (4% of your total grade). See the course schedule at the end of the syllabus for due dates. Also, see the discussion board guidelines posted on the D2L course webpage for complete instructions.

<u>Quizzes</u>: Five unannounced in-class quizzes will be given periodically throughout the semester. Each quiz will be worth 10 points. Your lowest two quiz grades will be dropped. Therefore, only your top 3 quiz scores will be counted towards your final grade for a total of 30 points (6% of your total grade).

Exams: Four exams will be given in class – three during the regularly scheduled class period, and one during the final exam period. Each exam will consist of multiple-choice questions and short answer questions. Any material from lecture, the text, videos, and related materials (even discussion points made by other students) are fair game for exam questions.

The three semester exams will not be cumulative, are each worth 100 points, and the lowest score of the three will be dropped. Therefore, your two highest semester exam scores determine the semester exam points you receive. Semester exams determine 40% of your final grade.

The final exam will be cumulative and is required - <u>it cannot be one of your dropped exams</u>. The final exam is worth 150 points (30% of your total grade).

<u>Makeup Quizzes and Exams</u>: No makeup quizzes or exams will be given unless you have a valid excuse. You must notify Dr. Weaver that you have a valid excuse by the end of the day of the given quiz or exam. Failure to do so will result in you not being allowed to take the makeup quiz or exam. There are no exceptions to these rules. Also, note that makeup quizzes consist of short answer questions.

If you cannot take an exam or quiz because of a religious holiday, required participation in a universitysanctioned event (e.g., a commitment for a sports team), or some other acceptable event that can be foreseen, you must notify Dr. Weaver **at least two weeks in advance**. Absence from an exam or quiz **for any other reason** – family obligations, job interviews, and vacations – will result in a grade of 0 for that exam or quiz.

All Exams will begin at 3:00pm. You may arrive late, but no more exams will be handed out after the first student completes the exam. Exams 1-3 must be turned in by 4:20pm. The Final Exam must be turned in by 5:00pm. During exams, you may only have pencils and erasers at your desk. Leave refreshments or other materials zipped up in your book bag or do not bring them at all. Turn off anything that makes noise. Once the exam has begun, there will be no talking or disruptions. Leaving the room is reserved for emergency bathroom breaks only. Exam grades will be posted online as soon as they are available from the scoring office. Exams will not be posted, but you may view your exams during Dr. Weaver's, or Rosaura's, office hours. However, each exam must be looked at before the next exam is given. For example, after Exam 2 has been given you are no longer permitted to view Exam 1.

Extra Credit: You may accumulate an additional 1% extra course points by participating in ongoing research. All such participation will be through the Department of Psychology's HPR (Human Participation in Research)

/ SONA program. You will receive 0.5 extra-credit points for each half-hour that you spend participating in an experiment or study, up to a maximum of 5 extra-credit points (or, 5 total hours = 10 half-hours). More detailed information for setting up your HPR / SONA account and how to sign up for research hours will be provided on the D2L course webpage.

<u>Alternative to research participation</u>: If you do not wish to participate in psychological research, you may write a research-based paper that is designed for this situation. Details about the paper requirements will be posted on D2L. All papers are due by November 22nd, 2019 at 5pm. The assignment folder will close promptly at 5pm and no papers will be accepted after this. <u>There will be no exceptions to this rule.</u>

Policy on grade changes: Extra credit is the only way to increase your point total if you are concerned about falling on the wrong side on one of these cut-offs. At the end of the semester, if you believe that an error was made in calculating your grade, please let Dr. Weaver know. Your grade will be checked and changed if an error was made. **This is the only circumstance under which your grade will change.** Under no circumstance will your grade be "bumped", or a special extra credit opportunity be given. Please don't ask. **There will be no exceptions.**

Cheating: Any student caught cheating on an exam, cheating on a quiz, plagiarizing an assignment, or plagiarizing a discussion post will receive a zero for the course, and be reported to the University.

Academic Honesty: Any and all forms of cheating are unacceptable. Students are expected to complete quizzes, exams, and written assignments individually and without outside help. Any student caught cheating on quizzes, exams, or written assignments will receive a ZERO in this course.
