#### **Course Overview**

This course explores human development during adolescence, a period characterized by major physical, cognitive, emotional, and psychological changes. We will focus on the complex interplay of factors that influence development, including the self, social relationships, environment, culture, and genetics. Additionally, this course will teach students how to critically analyze research articles and improve their scientific writing skills.

#### **Course Objectives**

By the end of this course, a student should be able to:

- Distinguish between key developmental psychology theories that apply to the period of adolescence
- Apply developmental theories to everyday situations and relationships
- Explain the interplay of nature and nurture in human development
- Identify key markers and milestones in adolescent development
- View current issues facing society from a developmental perspective
- Critically evaluate psychology research articles
- Write about psychology research articles in a clear and concise manner

## **Course Components**

**Exams (45%):** There are three exams in this course, including the final. These exams are comprised of multiple choice questions. Information from lectures, readings, and supplementary materials will be covered on the exams. Students arriving to take an exam AFTER other students have completed it will not be allowed to take the exam. This includes the Final Exam. It is your responsibility to be on time for all exams. The final exam will not be comprehensive.

Writing Assignments (45%): You will write 2 papers in this course.

- 1. Research Critique (10%)
- 2. Final Research Paper (25%)

Writing Quizzes (5%): You will complete writing quizzes in class that are based on grammar, sentence structure, and APA style. There are no makeup quizzes.

**Class Participation (5%):** I will take attendance every day in class. Two days of attendance will be dropped.
