Course Description

This course is asynchronous, which means that all activities for this course will be available through the course website, and we will not have any required synchronous (or live) meetings.

Please note that this class is worth 4 credits. Typically, 4-credit classes require 12-16 hours worth of work a week. Please take this into account when planning your schedule.

This course introduces the foundational concepts of psychology, a scientific discipline investigating human behavior, and help students become critical consumers of psychological media. The scientific investigations that make up psychology are broad and far-reaching, and I hope that this class will be your first step toward a greater understanding of yourself and the world around you.

Course Objectives

The primary learning objectives for this course are to:

- **Explore the field of psychology**, which is both broad and complicated. In this course, you will be exposed to a variety of areas of interest within the field of psychology, as well as the research methods utilized to investigate these areas.
- Learn the skills associated with scientific study and critical thinking. Whether
 you choose to continue studying psychology after this class, there are a number of
 basic scientific and critical thinking skills that will serve you well regardless of your
 area of study. These skills are an integral part of psychological science, and you will
 learn to employ them in understanding the nature of psychology.
- Apply the knowledge and skills gained in this course to everyday life. Unlike most other sciences, psychology is unique in its clear relation to our everyday lives. Studying psychology directly benefits you with a better understanding of yourself, others, and the world around you.

Both the textbook, activities and lectures emphasize an empirical approach to a scientific understanding of human behavior across psychology's diverse sub-fields. Each week will have modules that involve lectures, an activity or demonstration, a video and chapter quiz. To be successful in this course, students must synthesize information presented through these formats. This means that studying for tests should involve reviewing and integrating the essential ideas contained in both the D2L content and the textbook.

Graded Course Activities

- **Exams:** Seven exams will be given during the semester. Six will occur during the semester and one will occur during finals week. The exams will be comprised of 50 questions.
 - Exams will be **open-note and open-book**.

- Exams will be timed. You will have **1**¹/₂ **hours to complete each exam** (please talk with me if you have VISA accommodations).
- Each exam will consist of **multiple-choice questions**.
- You will take exams through D2L.
- Your lowest exam score will be dropped. For example, if you do well on the first six exams, your grade on the cumulative final exam will not matter (that is, it will be dropped) so you will not need to take it. Alternatively, if you do poorly on one of the first 6 exams, you can take the final exam to make up for the previous exam.
- No make-up exams will be given unless you have a valid, documented excuse (e.g., a note from the dean, a note from your doctor recommending that you not attend class). Any notes must explicitly state that "This student was unable to take the exam on (date) because ______." Simply having a bad cold is not an acceptable excuse. The note cannot come from someone in your family. You must notify the professor that you have a valid excuse by the end of the day of the exam or you will not be allowed to take the makeup exam. There are no exceptions to these rules.
- If you cannot take the exam because of a religious holiday, required participation in a university-sanctioned event (e.g., a commitment for a sports team), or some other acceptable event that can be foreseen, you must notify the professor <u>at least two weeks in advance</u> of exam day. Absence from an exam for any other reason family obligations, job interviews, and vacations will result in a grade of 0 for that exam. This is why you are able to drop your lowest exam grade... life can be complicated at times. I get it. BUT, DO NOT ASK TO MAKE UP THE EXAM IF YOU HAVE ANY OF THESE REASONS FOR MISSING THE EXAM!
- Exams will be available for 24 hours. That is, if the exams "opens" at 5am EST on a Friday, you have until 5am EST on Saturday to begin the exam. If you begin the exam 1 minute prior to the exam's close, you will still have the full time to complete the exam. However, I do not recommend waiting until the last moment to complete the exam because if you have a glitch in your network or some other problem, you may not be able to resolve the problem before the exam closes. I will not re-open an exam due to bandwidth problems or network problems. Please plan accordingly.
- Exam scores and grades will be available soon after the exam closes. If you
 would like to review your exam, you can do so during office hours or by
 appointment. Please note, however, I am still working to learn how to allow
 students to review exams during office hours and should have this worked
 out before the first exam.
- **Syllabus Quiz:** Students must complete the syllabus quiz on D2L. This quiz is worth 10 points and is designed to make sure that you read and understand the syllabus details including the objectives of the course, graded course assignments, office hours, and email policies. The syllabus quiz is **due on 9/6/20 by 11:59pm**. Late quizzes will not be accepted.
- **Chapter Quizzes:** Each chapter will have a chapter quiz at the end of the module/ chapter materials.

- There will be 15 Chapter Quizzes in total.
- Each chapter quiz will be worth 25 points.
- Your lowest quiz score will be dropped.
- No make-up quizzes will be allowed.
- Due before or at 11:59pm on Sunday of each week.
- Research Experience: One fundamental way of learning firsthand about psychological research is to participate in research studies. You are required to earn 7 hours of research participation credits through the Psychology SONA system.
 - Research experience is worth 40 points of your final grade. You can register an account and sign up for studies here: <u>https://msu-psychology.sona-</u> <u>systems.com</u>. You can also watch an online tutorial here: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_1OnT2ZU6QQ</u>.
 - The Psychology SONA system closes on Friday, December 11, 2020 at 5pm. There will not be any experiments conducted after this time.
 - Notes about Research Experience: Make sure that you are on the Psychology SONA site. The Department of Communication Arts and Sciences also has a SONA site. We do not have access to this data and cannot grant participation credit for experiments done under the other site.
 - Students under 18 years of age are ineligible for SONA experiments. Contact Audra Jeffrey (jeffre22@msu.edu), the SONA Student Coordinator in Room 100, Psychology Building, if you are under 18 in order to learn about non-SONA options for fulfilling your research education requirement.
 - Finally, your instructor and course assistants have nothing to do with SONA.
 ALL SONA questions, inaccuracies, or problems should be directed to Audra Jeffrey (jeffre22@msu.edu). It is your responsibility to sign up, participate in the experiments, and track your personal history on the computer. Neither the instructor nor the course assistants have a record of your research participations until the end of the course. We do not know how many credits you have or if you have penalty points.
 - Alternative to Research Experience: If you do not wish to participate in experiments, you may write 8 research-based papers that have been designed for this situation. Details about the paper requirements will be posted on D2L next week. Papers are due 1 week before the research participation is due to allow for time to grade. This means that you must get these papers in by Friday, December 11, 2020 at 5pm. No papers will be accepted after this date and time. <u>There will be no exceptions to this rule.</u> The system will not accept anything after 5pm on this date! In fact, the portal to submit these papers closes at 5pm so nothing is able to be turned in after this day and time.
