## **Course Components**

- **TopHat (15%):** We will use TopHat in every lecture, so make sure to bring your cell phone, tablet, or laptop to class. **Your grade will be based on completion, rather than correctness**. In other words, if you respond to a TopHat question in class, you will receive full credit, regardless of your answer. Using TopHat questions during lecture is a great way for me to track your understanding of the material. I will also post review questions on TopHat to help you study for exams. Your two lowest TopHat grades will be dropped at the end of the semester.
- Reading Response Assignments (20%): There are 3 short written homework assignments in this class. You will write a 2 page (double-spaced) reading response to research articles that are relevant to the topics we discuss in class. The articles are posted as PDF files on our D2L class page. You will turn in your responses via the dropbox function in D2L. All grades and feedback will be posted on D2L. Assignments are graded on a 3- point scale. All uploaded documents must be created in MS Word (.doc or .docx), Rich Text Format (.rtf), or as .pdf files. Documents that are created in other programs will not receive credit. Guidelines for reading responses are posted on D2L.

\*If you wish to dispute the grade you earned on a homework assignment, you must do so within 5 days (including weekends) of the date your grade and feedback were posted on D2L. There will be no exceptions. You are strongly encouraged to monitor your progress on a regular basis.

- Discussion Board (15%): In this class, you will post on the class discussion board on D2L every week. You will write one original post and two replies to other students. Guidelines for the discussion boards are posted on D2L. Discussion Board assignments are Due Saturdays by 11:59pm.
- Exams (50%): There will be four exams in this course, including the final exam. The third exam is an optional (makeup) exam on the last day of class. Each exam will comprise 40-45 multiple choice questions. The final exam is cumulative and worth 20% of your grade: half of the questions will be from the new material, and half of the questions will be based on material from exams 1 and 2.

\*Makeup Exam Information: The makeup exam is your chance to replace your lowest exam score (exam 1 or exam 2). The makeup exam is cumulative (comprises information from both exam 1 and exam 2). The makeup exam grade CANNOT replace your final exam grade. If you score lower on the makeup exam than exam 1 and exam 2, your makeup exam grade WILL NOT affect your grade in the course. The makeup exam is OPTIONAL: If you do not want to take the Makeup Exam, do not come to the last day of class.

Extra Credit: There are two options for extra credit in this course:

- Research Study Participation. This extra credit opportunity involves your participation in psychological research studies in our department. You will sign up to participate through the SONA system. You may complete up to 5 hours of research participation for 1% extra credit, so every half hour of research participation is worth .1% of your grade. The final day to complete SONA credits is Friday April 26<sup>th</sup>.
- 2) **Research Article Summaries**. The extra credit opportunity that does NOT involve research participation is reading research articles (posted on D2L) and writing a two-

page double-spaced summary of the article, including a thoughtful critical analysis of the article and ideas for future research on the topic in the article. Each paper is worth .2% of your grade, so 5 two-page papers would be worth 1% extra credit. The final day to complete extra credit papers is **Friday April 10**<sup>th</sup>.

## **Course Guidelines**

## • Lecture Material vs. Textbook Material

The lecture material is more important than the book material for your success in this course. I will not include exam questions that were not covered in lecture. The book is a guide that will help you learn more about specific topics we discuss in class, but reading every page of the book is not necessary. I will post lecture slides on D2L after class, but the slides do not contain all of the information you need to know. This is another reason you should attend class!

## Attendance

Class attendance is not mandatory, but it is strongly recommended because your success in this course depends on learning the material that is covered in lectures, and TopHat questions are a portion of your grade. I also encourage participating in class and asking questions.Exam attendance is mandatory. Makeup exams are only permitted in extremely extraordinary circumstances that adhere to university policies (vacations and travel plans are not valid excuses for missing an exam). Students arriving to take an exam AFTER other students have completed it will not be allowed to take the exam. This includes the Final Exam. It is your responsibility to be on time for all exams.

#### • D2L

Access to D2L is necessary for this course. You will turn in assignments via D2L. You should check D2L and your email regularly for announcements, reminders, and any changes to the course schedule. You are responsible for keeping track of due dates and class communication.

## • Use of Electronics in Class
