Course Description & Objectives

This course serves as an introduction to the scientific study of human behavior. It is a prerequisite for all other Psychology courses. In this course, you will:

1. Explore the field of psychology through various psychology subareas of interest.
2. Identify research methods used in each area of study.
3. Learn the skills associated with scientific study and critical thinking.
4. Apply new course knowledge and skills to your everyday life.
5. Engage in professional skill development related to scientific and critical thinking.

You will need to have access to high-speed internet connection and some sort of electronic device (laptop/computer is preferred) to access all course materials and assignments on D2L.

Course Structure and Expectations

PSY 101 is a challenging, fast moving, and structured course that consists of regular assignments and intermittent exams. This course is presented in an online format in sets of weekly modules. To stay on track, you must: **1) check your email and the D2L site frequently, and 2) complete lesson modules every week.** See below for a snapshot of what is expected of you.

*Please note that **there will not be an honors option** for this course. We are unable to offer honors options in summer courses.

Assignments & Evaluations

All key dates for assignments and exams are listed at the end of this syllabus (see Course Schedule and Calendar) – please mark them in your calendars to stay on track.

Important note: All due dates/times are **Eastern Time Zone**. Different time zones will not be accepted as an excuse for late or missed assignment. Neither makeups nor extensions will be given except for valid schedule conflicts or unavoidable emergency circumstances that are fully documented.

Another important note: You will notice that, with the exception of SONA hours due on the last day of the course, **assignment deadlines are at 5pm**. This is because I want to ensure that I am reachable prior to deadlines should any questions or issues arise.

- Please note that, with the exception of the first week of class (because it is not possible to do so), I have set up the course so that each week's corresponding module (including lectures and assignments) opens the weekend prior so that, should you wish to utilize your weekends to work on assignments, you can do so.

Final grades will be calculated based on percentage (%):

- **Application Activities (30%)**
As part of meeting the course objectives of learning skills of scientific and critical thinking, and applying concepts to your everyday life, every other week you will complete an individual application activity. The details of these assignments can be found in D2L in the assessments tab and in the applicable weekly content module. **You will**

need to complete each assignment and upload it to the appropriate assignment submission area in D2L by 5pm on the assigned due date. These activities will give you new and creative ways to think about and apply concepts. You must complete each activity independently. Please note that Turnitin will be used when grading these assignments and any instances of cheating or plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. See D2L for more information about Turnitin.

- **Discussions (30%)**

As part of meeting the course objective of engaging in professional skill development related to scientific and critical thinking, every other week you will connect with your peers in an asynchronous discussion group within D2L. The basic discussion prompt will be provided to you, or you may post a question about the material that you feel will improve your understanding of that week's content. The details of these discussion boards can be found in D2L in the communication tab and in the applicable weekly content module. **To receive full credit, you must provide an initial post by 5pm on the assigned date of discussion week and respond to at least two of your group members' comments by 5pm the following Friday.** Each discussion week will be worth 25 points: 15 points for your discussion post and 5 points for each response (x2).

- **Research Participation – SONA (5%)**

As part of meeting the course objective of understanding the research methods used in psychology, you must participate in seven (7) hours of research through Psychology's SONA system. Research experience is worth 5% of your final grade. You can register for an account and sign up for studies here: <https://msu-psychology.sona-systems.com>.

Double check that you are signing up for the Psychology SONA system! If you accidentally register for a different SONA system, the psychology department will not receive your participation credit. You will find all the additional details that you need to use the system in D2L. - Contact Audra Jeffrey (jeffre22@msu.edu), the SONA Student Coordinator, if you are **under 18** to learn about non-SONA options for fulfilling your research education requirement. Contact me by **June 10th** for an alternate research assignment if you would prefer not to participate in SONA research. The alternate research assignment with detailed prompt is posted on D2L under the assignments tab. You should submit your alternate SONA assignment by **Tuesday, June 25th at 5pm**. Extensions will not be granted beyond this date, so be sure to submit on time.

- **Exams (35%)**

To assess your new knowledge of the field of psychology, you will be given two exams. The midterm exam will take place during week four and cover content from the first three weeks, and the final exam will take place during week seven and cover content from weeks four through six. **Exams will take place on D2L; each exam will open on Wednesday of exam week at 5pm and will close Thursday at 5pm.** This means you will have access to start the exam within that 24-hour period. However, once you start, you will have a 2.5 hour time limit to complete the exam. If you start less than 2.5 hours

before the close of the exam (i.e., 3:30pm on Thursday or later), you will not get the full 2.5 hours as the exam will still close at 5pm. It is important to make sure you'll have good internet throughout the exam. **Internet and computer issues will not be accepted as valid reasons for needing a make-up exam.**

- **Extra Credit (up to +1%)**

You will have an opportunity to receive up to 1% applied to your final grade. The detailed requirements for this extra credit opportunity are posted on D2L under the discussion forum. You must complete your work independently and submit your post by **Friday, June 21st at 5pm**. Submissions beyond that deadline will not be accepted.

Policy on Grade Changes:

Extra credit is the only way to increase your point total if you are concerned about falling on the wrong side on one of these cut-offs. At the end of the semester, if you believe that an error was made in calculating your grade, please let me know promptly. Your grade will be checked and corrected if an error was made. This is the only circumstance in which your grade will change. Under no circumstance will your grade be “bumped,” or a special extra credit opportunity be given.

Use of Turnitin:

Consistent with MSU's efforts to enhance student learning, foster honesty, and maintain integrity in our academic processes, I have chosen to use a tool called Turnitin to compare your papers with multiple sources. The tool will compare each paper you submit to an extensive database of prior publications and papers, providing links to possible matches and a 'similarity score.' The tool does not determine whether plagiarism has occurred or not. Instead, I will make a complete assessment and judge the originality of your work. All submissions to this course may be checked using this tool. You should submit papers to Turnitin Dropboxes without identifying information included in the paper (e.g., name or student number), the D2L system will automatically show this information to me when I view the submission, but the information will not be retained by Turnitin.

Grading Disputes:

If you disagree with a grade you have received in this course, please email a justification for challenging the grade within one week following receipt of the grade. I will then review this request. Please note that if you find a grading error (i.e., addition error in total points, grade entry error, etc.) you do not need to complete a written justification and should instead email me as soon as possible to correct the mistake.

Make-Up Work for Legitimate Absences:

Students will not be penalized for absences during the semester due to unavoidable or legitimate circumstances. Such circumstances include verified illness, participation in intercollegiate athletic events, subpoenas, jury duty, military service, bereavement, religious observances, etc.

- **Missed Exam:** Missing an exam for any other reason will result in a grade of 0 for that exam. **I will not accept time zones, internet, or computer malfunction as a valid reason for late/missed exams.** It your responsibility to notify me of circumstances that will result in you missing an exam as far in advance as possible. Official documentation will be required.
- **Late Assignment:** You should submit all assignments by the posted deadlines (see course schedule and calendar at the end of this document). No late assignment will be accepted unless you have a valid, documented reason as described above. Please do not wait until the last minute to email me if you have any issues.

Any form of cheating or plagiarism, which includes any form of using, completing, or submitting someone else's work or letting them use, complete, or submit yours is unacceptable.
