Course Description

This course will provide you with an introduction to the field of community psychology. This field focuses on the study of socially significant problems and their solutions. It goes beyond focusing on individuals and integrates social, cultural, political, environmental, economic, and international factors to promote positive behavior change at multiple ecological levels.

By the end of the course, you will be able to:

1. Explain the factors that led to the development of community psychology and how the field differs from other fields in psychology.
 2. Identify important values, methods, and frameworks in community psychology.
 3. Evaluate socially significant problems through an ecological lens.
 4. Identify and apply common research methods used by community psychologists.

Course Structure and Expectations

This course will include lectures, group discussion, and classroom activities. For this course, you are required to complete the assigned readings *before* coming to class. The lectures will complement—not replace—the assigned readings. Although this is a large class, I expect you to be a fully engaged participant. Therefore, your attendance and contributions are critical to meeting my expectations and for earning a satisfactory course grade.

Although I will use D2L for course management and communication, I will not upload to disseminate my lecture notes or slides. All content covered in the course may be included on course assessments; therefore, you should make your best effort to attend each class session.

There is no Honors option for this course.

Course Assignments and Grading

Service Learning Activity

Although this is a lecture course, community-engaged learning is important in understanding community psychology. Thus, you will participate in a service learning activity. For this activity, you will complete a minimum of 10 hours of service learning

with a community organization (Honors students must complete 20 hours). Although the business sector is a part of the community, you cannot use hours accrued from a for-profit business in fulfillment of this course requirement.

In addition, you will be required to write a two-page (typed, double-spaced, Times New Roman 12-point font) reflection paper about your service learning experience. Later, I will provide you with more details. Please note the deadline in the Course Calendar on the last page of this syllabus.

Quizzes and Exams

You will complete a weekly quiz that will commence at the beginning of class, beginning the first full week of class.

You will have four (4) exams in this course, spaced about one month apart. The first three exams are not comprehensive. However, the fourth (i.e., final) exam is comprehensive.

I will give you a detailed study guide approximately one week prior to each exam. Use the study guide; anything on it is fair game for the exam. *If it is not on the study guide, it will not be on the exam.*

Make-Up Exam

If you miss one of the first three exams, you will have an opportunity to take a make-up exam. The make-up exam will consist of 12 multiple-choice/short answer questions; you will indicate your answer choice and write a short (i.e., no more than 3 sentence) justification for your answer. Note: you cannot make up the final exam.

Grading
